Gathering of Baptism Teams – November 2016

Introduction

Advent in the East was a six week period of preparation for the celebration of Baptism at Epiphany. In our western tradition we celebrate Advent, Christmas Epiphany as a cycle with different points of focus – preparation, celebration and manifestation. The Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord, on the Sunday after Epiphany, concludes this cycle. This evening we begin by recalling the Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan and explore together what the word 'beloved' means to us.
