# First Option FIRST READING

A reading from the Book of Lamentations 3:17-26

My soul is shut out from peace; I have forgotten happiness. And now I say, "My strength is gone, that hope which came from the Lord." Brooding on my anguish and affliction is gall and wormwood. My spirit ponders it continually and sinks within me. This is what I shall tell my heart, and so recover hope: the favours of the Lord are not all past, God's kindnesses are not exhausted; every morning they are renewed; great is his faithfulness. "My portion is the Lord" says my soul "and so I will hope in him." The Lord is good to those who trust him, to the soul that searches for him. It is good to wait in silence for the Lord to save.

## **RESPONSORIAL PSALM**

Psalm 80:2ac and 3b, 5-7 R. (4b)

R: God of hosts, bring us back; let your face shine on us and we shall be saved.

- 2: Lord God of hosts, how long will you frown on your people's plea?

# or: Second Option

#### FIRST READING

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans 8:31b-39

Brothers and sisters: With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us - he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us.

Nothing therefore can come between us and the love of Christ, even if we are troubled or worried, or being persecuted, or lacking food or clothes, or being threatened or even attacked.

As scripture promised:

For your sake we are being massacred daily and reckoned as sheep for the slaughter.

These are the trials through which we triumph, by the power of him who loved us.

For I am certain of this: neither death nor life, no angel, no prince, nothing that exists, nothing still to come, not any power, or height or depth, nor any created thing, can ever come between us and the love of God made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord.
